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WEEKLY APPLICATION

TAKEAWAY: Prayer is often kept in the peripheral of our lives, but Jesus teaches us to make it central.

HEAD CHANGE: To whom we pray is more important than how we pray.

HEART CHANGE: Jesus' teaching on prayer (The Lord's Prayer) addresses our anxieties and misconceptions.

LIFE CHANGE: Our prayers make a difference in partnering with God's will.

OVERVIEW

In this powerful exploration of prayer, we're reminded that our vision of God shapes our practice of prayer. The Lord's Prayer, found in Matthew 6 and Luke 11, serves as a blueprint for calming our anxieties about approaching the Divine. Jesus introduces us to God as 'Father,' revolutionizing our understanding of our relationship with the Creator.

This intimate address invites us into a deeper, more personal connection with God. We're challenged to reconsider our approach to prayer, moving it from the periphery of our faith to its central core. The message emphasizes that to whom we pray matters more than how we pray, encouraging us to cultivate a rich, vibrant prayer life rooted in understanding God's true nature as our loving Father.

"Pray then like this: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil."
